Course/Module description:

This seminar is dedicated to the Deccan, a semi-arid plateau at the "waistline" of peninsular India. This region has typically been a frontier between cultures, religions, polities, languages, and customs. One can portray the dynamics of southern and central India as those of tension and mutual insemination between the inhabitants of the plateau and those of the lush deltas that flank it from both east and west. A recurring pattern here has been that a radical innovation emerging from the Deccan gets assimilated and domesticated as it is exported to the delta regions. Thus the Deccan is one of the most productive and influential regions in the Indian subcontinent.

Course/Module aims:

Deep familiarity with the history and culture of the Deccan as a frontier area and as a laboratory in which some of the classical models of Indian cultures and religions were tried, including poetry, science, architecture, and music.

<u>Learning outcomes - On successful completion of this module, students should be</u> able to:

A good understanding of the culture of the Deccan, an acquaintance with its key sites and key personae, and familiarity with its literary corpus.
