Course/Module description:

This is a practical course (taught in two parts) designed to guide students in creating and preparing for their internship. The course is held every other week and taught as an active workshop where students work in small groups to identify, find, apply and plan their internship. The workshop begins by introducing students to the world of development, through providing an overview of the field and highlighting the main actors, the professional areas with in the field and different stages in development work.

The second part of the course (semester beit) will focus on preparing for the internship and will assist students in planning their internships by creating joint Terms of Reference with their hosting organization and in preparing for their internships.
