Course/Module description:

A survey of the major trends in Jewish History from the mid-19th century to the second half of the 20th century, covering the major communities in Europe, the Middle East, and America.

Topics include: Major Events and Trends; Geographies and Spaces; Emancipation, Assimilation, Acculturation; Modern anti-Semitism and Political Zionism; WWI and the Jews; The Holocaust

Course/Module aims:

This is a general introductory survey intended to help students understand the basics of Modern Jewish History. It employs a thematic and chronological approach. As a case in the study of modern history, it is also meant as a methodological introduction to further study in the scholarly literature in this field.

Students will gain a basic grasp of the major trends in the modern history of the Jews, including civic emancipation, cultural transformation, religious pluralization, mass migration, politicization and political movements, antisemitism, the impact of totalitarianisms of the 20th century, and the emergence of a late 20th-century constellation of world Jewry following the establishment of Israel.
