תאור כללי של הקורס:

Why do Israeli women undergo fertility treatments 8 times more than the international average? Why do liberal, secular, economically privileged Israelis have more children than their counterparts in other developed countries? What triggered a 'baby boom' among gay men in Israel? Why do Israeli women who choose 'childfree' lifestyles considered 'mentally unstable'? Why do conservative institutions in Israel formally support 'non-conservative' reproductive choices (such as single parent families and same-sex families? What role does the state play in these social situations? Or, in short; how does the Israeli 'pro-natal' culture look like, and what are its' gendered, political and symbolic implications today? This course discusses these questions as a window into the paradoxes and complexities of contemporary Israeli society. Drawing on major sociological and anthropological studies on in/fertility, on reproductive technologies, and on reproductive policies, the course explores the key role of 'pro-natal' ideologies in shaping normative gendered and sexual identities. Our discussion explores the formation of these identities as part of the 'Israeli Imagination' within and across medical, legal, and religious, national, and popular discourses; in the context of liberal and conservative life-views in contemporary Israeli society.
