Course/Module description:

Francesco Petrarch is considered the "Father of European Humanism" or at least the most significant and influential figure in early humanism. The aim of the course is to dive into the depths of Petrarch's "humanism" in order to understand its meanings and the connection between it and contemporary concepts of humanism and humanitarianism. The course will also examine Petrarch's direct influence on the development of humanism in Italy in the 15th and 16th centuries. The first part of the course will be devoted to examining the characteristics of Petrarchan humanism through a study of a series of issues arising from his writings: the nature of humanitas, the rise of historical consciousness, the classical world and Christianity, the ethics of care of the self, and the relationship between literature and gender. The second part of the course will focus on a number of Petrarch's successors in Renaissance Italy, including female humanists like Laura Cerpta and Isotta Nogrola
