Course/Module description:

Aural appreciation of a selection of works from the canon of Western art music ("classical" music; ca.1600-1950, focus on 18th and 19th centuries), representing major genres and techniques. Starting with the classical symphony, we'll consider the projection of the symphonic format on other genres after 1800. In vocal music, we'll listen to Renaissance polyphonic Church music, early accompanied monody in Italy, 17th century English songs, and 18th-century opera and oratorio and related liturgical forms.

Classes will concentrate on aural recognition and description of the chief musical elements and formal and generic patterns.

Starting with Schubert's 5th Symphony, the course also includes works by Taverner, Monteverdi, Dowland, Purcell, Bach, Handel, Haydn, Mozart, Beethoven, Chopin, Schumann, Brahms, Debussy and Shostakovich (not in chronological order)

Course/Module aims:

Furthering students' acquaintance with the canonic repertoire of Western art music.

Introduction to major techniques and genres representative of the Western canon, and their aural implementation.

Developing students' aural and theoretical skills to independently explore new works of "classical" music.

<u>Learning outcomes - On successful completion of this module, students should be able to:</u>

Aurally identify and describe works from the required listening list. Aurally identify and describe major techniques and genres of Western art music in unfamiliar works.

Course/Module Content:

motif and theme; Repetition vs. variation; musical texture; articulation; timbre and orchestration; melodic line (rhythm, structure, contour, etc.); vocal styles (melismatic vs. syllabic, recitative vs. aria, etc.); musical form (ternary, theme & variations, rondo, sonata); major genres (symphony, concerto, string quartet, sonata, piano trio, fugue, opera, oratorio, mass.)
