Course/Module description:

Music from the 18th to the 20th centuries; a chronological overview from Bach and the Classical style to Rock and the Beatles. Music as part of Western culture, within artistic, scientific, social and political contexts.

An inter-disciplinary approach based on listening to representative masterpieces in different styles and acquiring familiarity with basic concepts in musical thinking.

Familiarity with styles and major trends in western musical history. Encountering basic concepts in musical thinking. Viewing music within a cultural and historical context.
