Course/Module description:

The self is the corner stone of Western thought and its ideal-type. This is the case for some of the most influential modern thinkers, including, for example, Descartes, Schelling, and Schopenhauer. Still the most fertile space for this "self" is literature. This is because literature is the place par excellence for the self's expression. And, interestingly, this self-expresses itself through action. In this seminar we shall follow the self in modern literature and reflect on the way it describes itself doing. The self indeed expresses and imagines itself through action. How does the self thinks, travel, fall in love, do business, behave in public, decide, and make judgements? The seminar will open with a discussion of self and action in some of the seminal works in German literary tradition including Kafka, Mann, and Kleist. The rest of this advanced seminar will be directed by the student's interests and research projects. The objective of this seminar is also to facilitate the beginning of the student's MA research projects.
