Course/Module description:

The literature on tense and aspect which is based on a neo-reichenbachian approach taking these categories to express topological relations between time intervals, enables to conceive members of a given temporal system as having fixed interpretative properties. At the same time, when observing tense/aspect inflected verbal forms in various discursive context, a somewhat different picture may emerge. In this course, we would like to examine these two ways of conceiving the interpretative properties of inflected verbal forms and explore where the context and context-less approaches meet and what insights can be gained from combining the two.

Course/Module aims:

- familiarization with prevalent theories of tense and aspect
- examine the importance of context for semantic analysis
- understand the inter-relation between semantics and pragmatics
