Course/Module description:

The Course presents the Akkadian language, esp. that of the Old Babylonian period (c. 1800-1500 BCE) in its historical and linguistic context. The course is philological by nature.

We shall learn nominal and verbal declinations, c. 100 cuneiform signs, and basic syntactic structure in Akk.

Most of the second semester is dedicated to the preparation and reading in class of Akk. texts.

Course/Module aims:

To reach solid knowledge of Akk. morphology (nouns and verbal forms).

To learn basic syntactic structures in Akk.

To know c. 100 cuneiform signs.

To bring the class to the level needed for 2nd/3rd year Akk.
