Course/Module description:

The course is designed to sharpen your ability to analyze and respond more fully to humor by focusing on Shakespeare's comedies. Apart from Shakespeare's comedies, reading material includes material from the philosophy of comedy.

Course/Module aims:

Identifying comic structures, familiarization with philosophical issues relating to humor, deepening response to and knowledge of Shakespeare. Students will also specialize throughout the course in a single comedy.

Learning outcomes - On successful completion of this module, students should be able to:

Analyze structural aspects of humor, evaluate comic performance, identify political and philosophical aspect of comedy.
