Course/Module description:

Pictures of the Floating World (ukiyo-e) is the term given to woodblock prints which

flourished in Japan during the early modern period. The prints depicted scenes of the pleasure quarters, kabuki scenes, and landscapes, and served also as illustrations to poetry albums and various other books.

This course offers a detailed discussion of particular themes in the development of woodblock prints and their appreciation. For example: influence of printed Chinese books, famous ukiyo-e artists, privately commissioned prints (surimono), erotic prints (shunga), and the relation between Meiji export and the European Japonisme. The course will give students a set of tools for the analysis of ukiyo-e and will touch upon methodological questions of analyzing Japanese arts.

Course/Module aims:

Understanding and recognizing the technique, history, and styles of Japanese woodblock prints.

Developing academic faculties, such as: critical reading, writing a seminar paper, and presenting.
